# SESSION DESCRIPTIONS

'My Unbounded Joy': Susie King-Taylor and the War of Jubilee
Dr. Hermina Glass-Hill, Executive Director
Susie King Taylor Women's Institute & Ecology Center

The Civil War was at the front door of Georgia's hostess city, Savannah, perched on high ground on the south bank of its namesake river. Urban city dwellers including hired out slaves like Dolly, a washerwoman, and her twelve-year-old granddaughter Susannah, nicknamed Susie, were within earshot of the rumble and roar of the advanced weaponry being used in the siege of Fort Pulaski. The rising smoke signaled an opportunity that would alter the course of young Susie's life forever.

Elizabeth Botume was a teacher who established a school in Port Royal, teaching from 1864-1904. In October 2024, her family donated part of her papers and photographs to the Reconstruction Era NHP.

Poetic Echoes of the Reconstruction Era: Ellen Murray's Reflections

Ellen Murray, one of the founders of the Penn School, published poetry in numerous newspapers throughout her time in Beaufort, South Carolina. This presentation will highlight a few of her poems while bringing in historical context of the time period.

Esther Hill Hawks: Doctor, Educator, Abolitionist

This presentation will explore the dynamic career of Esther Hill Hawks, a physician and educator affiliated with the 1st South Carolina Volunteers. Through her recordkeeping—including diaries and correspondence—we learn more about the lived experiences of the men and women of the 1st South Carolina VAD, illuminating the scope and importance of their efforts. Her writings also offer insight into how women navigated male-dominated fields such as medicine and education during the nineteenth century.

### HIST B492: Atlantic Slavery & Antislavery

In Hist 492 students explore the rise and fall of racial slavery in the Atlantic World, as well as the rise of antislavery activism and the death of Atlantic slavery in the 19th century.

For their final project students were offered the chance to create a portfolio based on USCT pension records. In addition to gaining firsthand experience working with primary documents, they are using pension records to complete a biography of a USCT veteran or their wife, create a social media post, and write an essay linking their subject to the history of slavery in the Atlantic.

### ARTS B215, B100 & B315 Beginning, **Intermediate & Workshop in Printmaking**

Joanna Angell, Ass. Professor of Art, USC Beaufort

Students from various disciplines and experience levels receive an introduction to printmaking, along with intermediate relief and intaglio techniques and the execution of original works.

After a presentation from ISRE staff, students used the stories and images of women from the Reconstruction Era such as Susie King Taylor and Diana Grayson to inspire a design for a copper plate etching which can be used to create multiple printed copies of the image.
