

USCB Human Services department's Mission Statement

University of South Carolina, Beaufort's (USCB) baccalaureate degree in Human Services prepares students for employment or advanced study in the art and science of care. As a growing field of study emerging in response to an increasingly sophisticated global economy, this liberal arts interdisciplinary degree produces graduates with attitudes, values, knowledge, and skills to make a positive difference. In addition to Human Services courses, the program draws heavily from the disciplines of sociology and psychology. It also provides a series of internships so that students gain the ability to apply the knowledge and skills learned through their coursework.

The program was awarded accreditation in December 2018 from the National Council on Standards for Human Services Education. USCB's program is the only accredited bachelor's degree in Human Services in South Carolina.

NOHS Conference

The National Organization for Human Services (NOHS) Conference was held virtually this year on October 20-22. The USCB Human Services Program enrolled a team of Ambassadors, registering nine students and a professor to participate in the Conference. The mission of the event is for the opportunity to help individuals gain an abundance of knowledge as it relates to the broad field of Human Services. The NOHS Conference is meant for individuals to share information, get to know one another, and learn from each other tactics on how to push the profession forward.

ZaNiiya Gerald, a Student Ambassador who attended the conference said, "My absolute favorite session from the conference was Self-Care for Helping Professional- Taking Care of YOU While Taking Care of Everyone Else by Jessica Brubaker. I am very passionate about helping others and pursuing a career in mental health." In agreement with Jessica, ZaNiiyah stated "We can provide care for others, but when the time comes to direct our time and energy to taking care of ourselves, we deem it to be less important (sometimes subconsciously) and simply don't do it."

Ambassador **Qaadir Phillips** also came away with a lot from the Self Care - Anxiety session, especially that the presenter believes that you should choose to nurture your relationship with yourself before you can nurture your relationship with others. Ms. Brubaker shared different Self-Care Plans for Anxiety, DIY, Self-Esteem and Motivation which she encouraged the participants to read, think about, and work with when trying to better your relationship with yourself.

Patricia Simmons, another USCB Student Ambassador was able to attend multiple sessions and said she was "humbly grateful" for being selected to attend the Conference. As a first-time conference attendee with the Department of Human Services, she was welcomed and acknowledged with open arms by Steve Kashdan, President of NOHS. Qaadir also had great things to say about his interaction with Steve Kashdan. Qaadir was able to sign up as a volunteer at the business meeting session. He believes that NOHS, as an all-volunteer organization, its success is based on its commitments from others. Qaadir was able to attend about 3-4 sessions a day and learned about different ways we, as HS professionals, can help those who need us.

Resilience - An Active Strategy

A session in which Student Ambassadors participated at the NOHS Conference was titled **Resilience: How Can We Build it in Ourselves and Others** by Lucy Hone. During this session she spoke about being able to "Help yourself and team cope with constant challenge and change". She says that active strategy is what is mostly needed when dealing with Human Services aspects. We make the work seem so perfect sometimes, but she reminded us that we should stop pretending the world is perfect. We should also be mindful of what you focus on "Change what you can change" says Ms. Hone. Resilience is about nature, nurture and knowing that other people matter. Lucy Hone also says that you should train greater mental agility so you can work out how to approach certain situations. One of the most interesting parts of this session was when she explained that giving young children hope is the best way to teach them resilience. Parents or guardians need to keep them thinking about the future and if they are going through a tough time ask them how they've gotten through other tough times. When time goes by, ask them if they remember having a bad patch a couple weeks ago and assure them that they can get through anything and they have a future to look forward to, but they have to want to get through it. Ms. Hone also stated that you should ask those who show signs of discouragement "if something goes wrong and you lose hope, what else are you hoping for now? What else is important to you?".

This session was very important and gave an idea of how to be more in-tune with individuals and show supportiveness. What I took away from the session is that you have to "get yourself through what you are facing with hope. Build your own picture with self-resilience of what helps and what harms. Be realistic and optimistic change what possible, what you can control. Understand the ways you are living and find middle ground. Consider resilience through a collective lens, then pace yourself through tough times. Look for good/positive things and find those things to look forward to."

Articulation Agreements

The Articulation Agreements strengthens state-wide presence and relationships with two-year college partners. It focuses on supporting the goal of increased enrollment and student retention for The University of South Carolina Beaufort Human Services Program. The articulation agreement also makes the Human Services Program more efficient by streamlining the transfer process and providing additional guidance and data for two-year college students to transition to USCB.

During the summer of 2021, Provost Eric Skipper announced an Academic Affairs reorganization at USCB, focused on creating and cultivating a forward-thinking organizational model for the University. As a result of that reorganization, the Human Services Program was moved from the Department of Social Sciences and combined with Public Health to create the Department of Public Health & Human Services (DPHHS). This departmental arrangement will improve collaborations and efficiencies for the two Programs. Dr. Diana Reindl will serve as the Interim Chair for the Department, and Dr. Najmah Thomas will continue in the position of Human Services Program Coordinator.

Discussions on how to best leverage the new partnership for the future are well underway. Plans are being implemented to cross promote the major/minor model for our students, making it an attractive option for a Human Services major to minor in Public Health, and vice versa. And, we have already seen our respective student clubs (Human Services Student Association and Public Health Association) collaborate successfully on an awareness and support project for World AIDS Day.
